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♦ his month, the *Journal of the American* Academy of Dermatology (JAAD) is relaunching the Consultative Dermatology section with an article on complex purpura from Gehlhausen et al. This section was initially launched in 2017 with the goal of addressing issues related to the care of patients with complex medical dermatology conditions in both outpatient and inpatient settings. We relaunch this section with the goal of increasing awareness of the critical role of dermatologists within the House of Medicine through the publication of articles related to the diagnosis and management of complex dermatologic disease. Dermatology was one of the first 4 recognized medical specialties in the United States because there has always been a need for special expertise in the diagnosis and treatment of skin disease. We have entered a new age of medical therapy with highly effective targeted drugs for malignancy, new immunomodulating agents, and a vast array of new biologics. Our specialty has been at the cutting edge of these developments, with effective therapies for conditions ranging from metastatic melanoma to refractory dermatomyositis and autoinflammatory disorders. Our expertise is also key to the management of the many cutaneous adverse effects of these new agents.

The JAAD Consultative Dermatology section's goal aligns with the American Academy of Dermatology's SkinSerious campaign and the missions of its sister societies, including the Society of Dermatology Hospitalists and the Medical

Dermatology Society. The American Academy of Dermatology's National Burden of Skin Disease Report estimated a direct cost of \$75 billion for the treatment of skin disease, with 75% of these costs related to outpatient services. ^{2,3} We treat some of medicine's most challenging disorders, and the explosion in available diagnostic tools and an expanded therapeutic armamentarium have improved patient outcomes.

We welcome articles that focus on the diagnosis and management of complex dermatologic disease and address existing practice gaps. Articles that appeal to a multispecialty audience are encouraged, and we will make selected high-impact articles open access to increase their reach. Brevity and focus are key, and supplemental material can be hosted on Mendeley with a link in the print or online versions of the article. JAAD no longer publishes case reports, but our sister journal JAAD Case Reports welcomes unique case reports and case series.
