MARCH IOTADERMA (#325)

Question: Do you know what a costal fringe is?

**Answer:** Costal fringe refers to the common clinical observation of several (sometimes many) prominent telangiectasias along the anterior costal margins in adult (ie, elderly) men. It is often associated with dermatoheliosis and is uncommon in females. It has absolutely no relationship to the *caput medusae* caused by portal hypertension and hepatic dysfunction. This frequent cutaneous display is not known to be associated with any systemic disease, the presence of varicose veins, or any vascular diseases. A costal fringe is an uncommon physical finding in young adults or children. Treatment is usually patient (and referring physician) reassurance.
