## A guide for medical students and trainees to find virtual mentorship in the COVID era and beyond



To the Editor: Mentorship is critically important in medical careers and can shape the future trajectory for medical students in particular. However, access to mentorship may be limited for several important groups. In a survey of fourth-year medical students at one institution, students pursuing non-primary care specialties and women felt they did not receive adequate mentorship.<sup>1</sup> Mentorship has traditionally been conducted face to face and is often limited geographically to students' medical schools, putting students in certain regions and those without a home dermatology program at a disadvantage. A publication describing the perspectives of 4 medical students who matched in dermatology highlighted mentorship as one of the most crucial factors to successfully match.<sup>2</sup> Therefore, we must build upon the opportunity during COVID-19 to expand virtual mentorship to improve access to mentorship in dermatology. We describe current challenges faced by medical students and provide recommendations to increase mentorship in the future.

Despite the documented importance of mentorship in pursuing and successfully matching into dermatology, minority medical students report that limited access to mentorship is a major barrier to applying for dermatology residency.<sup>3</sup> Connecting with mentors of minority demographics can pose a challenge given that as of 2018, less than 6% of dermatology faculty at United States medical schools identified as Black (0.5% male and 2.2% female) or Latino (1.4% male and 1.4% female).4 Access to mentorship may be particularly limited for students without a home program or those seeking mentorship from either of these minority groups. Virtual mentorship may serve to expand and diversify the workforce in academic dermatology. Additionally, having multiple mentors and "establishing a mentorship team" has been recognized as a way to identify and reduce "mentorship malpractice" where mentees are misguided or taken advantage of, further highlighting the need for increased access to mentorship.<sup>5</sup>

Structured mentorship programs are fewer and harder to come by for medical students when compared with opportunities for residents and faculty who interact daily with established dermatologists and potential mentors (Table I). We believe that more focus should be placed on creating mentorship opportunities for medical students and have outlined suggestions for making this possible (Fig 1).

Although the benefits of virtual mentorship are numerous, downsides to this approach deserve consideration. The close nature of some mentoring relationships may take longer to mature in a virtual setting, and it may be more difficult to find a good fit because the relationship does not develop as organically as it would in person. Additionally, coordination of schedules to accommodate time zone differences and schedules may be challenging.

Even when we are able to put the COVID-19 pandemic behind us, we can continue to utilize a blend of in-person and virtual modalities to foster mentorship within the field of dermatology. The goal of these modalities is to include all backgrounds and ensure mentorship availability for those who would otherwise be unable to engage, such as those without the institutional support or financial means or those with family obligations.
